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OREGON POTATO COMMISSION NAMES WINNERS OF SECOND ANNUAL "OREGON POTATOES GOODNESS UNEARTHED GOLD MEDAL AWARDS"

Awards given to standout potatoes, highlighting flavor and texture from different terroirs

PORTLAND, Ore. – February 1, 2013 – The Oregon Potato Commission (OPC) held its second annual "Oregon Potatoes Goodness Unearthed Gold Medal Awards" on January 30 at the annual Washington-Oregon Potato Conference in Kennewick, Wash. The awards program was developed to highlight the flavor distinctions between varieties in different growing regions throughout Oregon.

Growers entered potatoes by variety – russets, yellows, reds and specialty – and seven professional chefs from the American Culinary Federation's Chefs de Cuisine Society of Oregon, carefully judged each potato in the categories of taste, texture, appearance and aroma.

The judging chefs found considerable differences within each category: "It's fascinating how two potatoes of the same variety can have a range of flavor differences simply because they are grown in two different *terroirs*, or growing regions," said Chef Leif Benson, Oregon's 2010 and 2012 chef of the year and OPC public member. "Similar to wine, natural elements like the soil and climate can impact the potato's flavor, texture and aroma."
